## Draft Assessment Report - Recorded Crime in Scotland

Thanks for the chance to discuss your draft report earlier on Tuesday. While I hope you saw suggestions around accuracy of report's content, I promised to follow

up our meeting with my personal views on the re-assessment process and dedesignation decision.

On the process, my initial understanding was that this was to seek reassurance that the quality concerns found for England and Wales statistics were not replicated in Scotland. These were a disquiet among users about quality of the underlying data, a lack of assurance around recording practices, and a differing trend between the survey and administrative data, linked to the use of the recorded crime figures in police performance management. We agreed that you would seek reassurance from our users, and that I would ensure we delivered evidence on the other two reasons.

We have now given good evidence on the comparison between survey and admin data, you found few concerns from users, and, while the planned HMICS audit will be more comprehensive, the 2013 HMICS audit, combined with other long-standing assurance processes, suggests little evidence that there are flaws in recording or quality assurance practices. In fact, the report does not provide any evidence of significant or systematic problems with the quality of the recording of the data. To avoid any confusion from our users, this finding should be very clearly communicated in the report.

We got our final designation letter last July for other official statistics products based on the recorded crime data (homicide, domestic abuse, firearms). How UKSA considers data from administrative systems in its assessment work has clearly moved on since then. While this policy is still under development by the UKSA, it seems unreasonable to apply an approach to assessment that has not yet been decided or communicated.

Taking these issues together, I want to challenge the proposal on de-designation. I believe that we're at a point now where we can be fairly confident about the quality of recording and data management practices. Once we have the HMICS audit and your policy on taking statistics from administrative data is published, I'd be much more comfortable about accepting the decision of the assessment committee at that stage.

As I mentioned when we met, I am concerned about how my users would view a decision to de-designate these statistics at this time. Ed has explained to me that the situation in Scotland is different from that in England and Wales. This came up at our meeting too. I believe that as currently worded, the report would send a clear message that there isn't a difference, and also that the Scottish statistics and data could not be trusted. Whilst I recognise that a foreword from Ed may go some way to achieving this,

I think it is critical that para 1.2.6 should be re-written with this need for clarity of message in mind.

Finally, I feel that the criticism that we have done little to improve the quality of the statistics since the original assessment in 2009 is unjustified. We have delivered on the requirements of this previous assessment. If has given a lot of detail on what we have done to improve the data management, engagement with users and products, so I won't repeat those issues here. I would now ask you to reconsider the evidence you now have and the conclusions you can draw from this.

I would be helpful if you could let me know what you think about the concerns and issues I have raised here.
