Further to my earlier email, please find attached an initial draft version of the outline of a framework of assurance.

As I mentioned, I thought it might be helpful to highlight one definitional/conceptual consideration – we see the framework of assurance as the sum of all things that are done to provide assurance about the quality of the data and statistics. The bulk of this proposal would be focussed on what we've termed the 'description of the framework of assurance' the purpose of which is to provide transparency and clarity to users about what is done to assure the quality of the statistics. The text within this description of the framework could be restricted to giving an overview of that particular section with links to other documents that contain the bulk of the information. In drawing up this framework, we consider there to be four key documents that should provide the assurance required, namely i) a document which brings together all the information relating to the administrative system for collecting the data and the context within which it operates within Police Scotland, ii) a document describing the relationship between Police Scotland and the SG in terms of statistics production, iii) Statement of Administrative Sources and iv) a document describing the SG's judgement of the quality of the data, including audit information, and the implications for the use of the statistics.

We are also considering four strategic areas: users, improvement, risk and governance. So one option would be to present the framework based on those four elements. We could keep the existing matrix structure as a list of things that need to be done but map each component to one of these four elements. We've had a very quick go at this in the attached one page document, where governance = working with partners and managing change, risk – identifying, managing and resolving risk, improvement = identifying areas for development and improvement and users = two-way communication with users. However we recognise that we may need to add in a few additional components to fully cover the strategic areas (e.g. more emphasis on two-way rather than one-way communication with users).

As you will see, this is still very much "work in progress", but hopefully it will form a useful basis for our discussions on Tuesday.



Many thanks for your reply. Re confirmation of timings, then letting us know this week is fine with us.

Yes, we will send you some material re requirements 10 and 11, in advance of the meeting.

On a related matter, and as you are aware, the Assessment Report also states that the "Scottish Government should, working with HMICS or other appropriate bodies, combine existing and new material into a coherent framework of assurance. Most of this material exists, or will be available once HMICS publish their next report examining the integrity of crime recording in Scotland; but is has not been incorporated into a coherent framework."

For information, there are two references made to the "framework of assessment" in the Statement by the Head of Assessment and further references are made to a "framework"/"framework of assurance" in sections 1.2.3 and 1.2.8 of the report.

I understand that there is no standard template and that it is up to ourselves to consider, for this particular set of statistics, how best to bring together and publish the range of actions and evidence that we use to assure ourselves of the quality of the underlying data. We have been considering the range of material presented in the Exposure Draft Report *Quality Assurance and Audit Arrangements for Administrative Data*' which was published by the Authority on 31 July 2014, and are developing a framework of assurance.

Again, would this be something which we could share with you and also discuss at our meeting on the 16th?



Many thanks for your reply.

Your offer for both yourself and **to** come up to Edinburgh for a face to face meeting is much appreciated. I would agree that, in the first instance, it would certainly be beneficial to meet face to face.

In terms of a suitable date, could I suggest Tues 16<sup>th</sup> September? We are flexible re a morning or afternoon meeting on the 16<sup>th</sup> so happy to work around your preferred travel plans. For information, we are located in Victoria Quay which is in Leith, in the north of Edinburgh. However I suggest that we meet in St Andrew's House which is in the centre of Edinburgh (and is a more convenient location for us to meet). From the airport, you can take a tram or Airport link bus to the city centre (30-40 mins) followed by a 5-10 mins walk to St Andrew's House. However I will send you further details re location etc.

As well as discussing the requirements around commentary and the suggestion on presentation of graphs, I agree that it would also be helpful to discuss the requirements around user engagement and for you to offer some advice in relation to these. Thanks for your email and for sending the links to the various documents. Whilst we are with you, as well as discussing the requirements around commentary and the suggestion on presentation of graphs, we can also discuss the requirements around user engagement and offer some advice in relation to these, if you think that would be helpful.

We've had a look at potential dates and are both available on 9th, 15th or 16th September if any of those would work for you. 8th September would also be a possibility but I have an appointment that day that I would need to re-arrange so would prefer to only consider that if none of the other dates would work for you. I realise these dates are all fairly soon but I'm on leave for a fortnight from 20th September and we thought it would be good to try and see you before I go.

## UK Statistics Authority - Assessment Report 288 – Statistics on Recorded Crime in Scotland

Further to my phone call this afternoon, thank you for offering to provide advice and support as we deliver the requirements within the above assessment report. As I mentioned, we have developed an Action Plan which identifies the actions which we plan to take forward to meet the requirements in the assessment report. We are also developing a "framework of assurance" which will takes account of the report, published by the Authority on 31 July, on *Quality Assurance and Audit Arrangements for Administrative Data*. We have also developed an action

plan for a User Guide. I shall send you copies of these documents next week, after the meeting of our Steering Group on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> August.

We discussed how best we could take forward our joint working, re addressing the requirements and suggestions. We agreed that, in the first instance, I would send you a link to the latest publication *Recorded Crime in Scotland*, 2012-13 as well as links to other related documentation. These links are provided at the foot of this email. As discussed, I am copying in the Good Practice team as you had mentioned that you would aim to speak with colleagues in that team before we speak next. I am also copying in my colleague **Content**, in Justice Analytical Services, who produces the Recorded Crime in Scotland statistical bulletin.

We can then perhaps consider the subset of requirements and suggestions where it might be best to focus our joint attention. You will be aware that there are requirements and suggestions related to commentary (Requirement 17) and to the presentation of graphical information (Suggestion 8) and it would be particularly helpful if you could consider these.

I would also like to highlight that following police reform on 1 April 2013, our next publication (due for publication in October 2014) will not include information on (legacy) police force areas. It will continue to provide information at a national level as well as at a local authority level. For information, the <u>Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012</u> brought together the eight former police forces, the Scottish Police Services Authority and the Scottish Crime and Drug Enforcement Agency into a single Police Service of Scotland from April 1, 2013.

Thank you once again for your offer of assistance. I look forward to hearing from you in due course, once you have had an opportunity to consider and discuss the requirements and suggestions within the assessment report, with your colleagues.
