Hi Ed,

Thanks for emailing about this. I'm really glad that [REDACTED] is having a good time so far - it's been fantastic having [REDACTED] in the team.

I absolutely think this is the right aim. The only issue I can see arising is where [REDACTED] is working on something that turns into a case we want to escalate to the OSR. If we get any cases like that I propose that [REDACTED] hands over the work straight away to a Full Fact staff member.

If that sounds ok to you, I will speak to [REDACTED] quickly tomorrow to make sure [REDACTED] knows to talk to me or [REDACTED] if [REDACTED] has any concerns about this. I am copying [REDACTED] so that she is aware of this.

It reminded me that there's one aspect of governance that I wanted to run past you. It concerns the scenario where [REDACTED] might be asked to comment on work that the Office for Statistics Regulation has done, or might work on an issue that Full Fact want to refer on to us. If those situations arise, I think it'd be sensible not to ask [REDACTED] to work - so to speak - on both sides of the issue. In practice, I think this would mean that [REDACTED] shouldn't work on something that Full Fact decide to refer to us, or that may involve criticisms of us.

I think these scenarios are extremely unlikely, but it's better to think of them in advance.

Would those arrangements be OK from your point of view?
