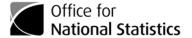
Consumer Price Inflation May 2017

Coverage: UK

SUMMARY

CPIH

The Consumer Prices Index including owner occupiers' housing costs (CPIH) is the most comprehensive measure of inflation. It extends the Consumer Prices Index (CPI) to include a measure of the costs associated with owning, maintaining and living in one's own home, known as owner occupiers' housing costs (OOH), along with council tax. Both of these are significant expenses for many households and are not included in the CPI.

Aside from including owner occupiers' housing costs (OOH) and council tax, CPIH is otherwise identical to CPI. This means that, aside from these two components, the factors contributing to the CPI rate are the same as those contributing to the CPIH. For example, if food is reported as increasing the CPIH rate, it is also acting to increase the CPI rate. The size of the contributions for components other than OOH and council tax are exaggerated in the CPI compared with the CPIH because they account for a larger proportion of the overall index.

CPIH is not currently a <u>National Statistic</u>. It has been reassessed by the Office for Statistics Regulation (OSR) against the standards set out in the <u>Code of Practice for Official Statistics</u>. The <u>assessment report</u> published on 3 March 2016 included a number of requirements that need to be implemented for CPIH to regain its status as a National Statistic and we are working to address these.

The main movements for CPIH in May 2017 are:

- The all items CPIH is 103.5, up from 103.2 in April.
- The all items CPIH annual rate is 2.7%, up from 2.6% in April.
- The annual rate for CPIH excluding indirect taxes, CPIHY, is 2.6%, up from 2.5% last month.
- The OOH component of CPIH is 104.2, up from 104.1 in April.
- The OOH component annual rate is 2.1%, down from 2.2% last month.
- The CPIH all goods index is 101.7, up from 101.1 in April.
- The CPIH all goods index annual rate is 3.0%, up from 2.4% last month.
- The CPIH all services index is 104.9, up from 104.8 in April.
- The CPIH all services index annual rate is 2.6%, down from 2.8% last month.

Consumer Prices Index (CPI)

The CPI continues to be a National Statistic and is a measure of consumer price inflation produced to international standards and in line with European regulations. First published in 1997 as the



Harmonised Index of Consumer Prices (HICP), the CPI is the inflation measure used in the Government's target for inflation.

The CPI is also used for purposes such as uprating pensions, wages and benefits and can aid in the understanding of inflation on family budgets. For more information see <u>Users and uses of consumer price inflation statistics</u>.

The main movements for CPI in May 2017 are:

- The all items CPI is 103.3, up from 102.9 in April.
- The all items CPI annual rate is 2.9%, up from 2.7% in April.
- The annual rate for CPI excluding indirect taxes, CPIY, is 2.7%, up from 2.6% last month.
- The annual rate for CPI at constant tax rates, CPI-CT, is 2.7%, up from 2.5% last month.
- The CPI all goods index is 101.7, up from 101.1 in April.
- The CPI all goods index annual rate is 2.9%, up from 2.4% last month.
- The CPI all services index is 105.1, up from 105.0 in April.
- The CPI all services index annual rate is 2.8%, down from 3.0% last month.

Retail Prices Index (RPI)

In accordance with the Statistics and Registration Service Act 2007, the Retail Prices Index and its derivatives have been assessed against the Code of Practice for Official Statistics and found not to meet the required standard for designation as National Statistics. The <u>full</u> <u>assessment report</u> can be found on the UK Statistics Authority website.

The RPI is a legacy measure of UK inflation that continues to be published because of its use in long-term contracts and index-linked gilts. For further information see <u>Users and uses of consumer price inflation statistics</u>.

The main movements for RPI in May 2017 are:

- The all items RPI is 271.7, up from 270.6 in April.
- The all items RPI annual rate is 3.7%, up from 3.5% last month.
- The annual rate for RPIX, the all items RPI excluding mortgage interest payments (MIPs) index, is 3.9%, up from 3.8% last month.
- The all goods RPI is 206.3, up from 205.5 in April.
- The all goods RPI annual rate is 4.1%, up from 3.9% last month.
- The all services RPI is 370.5, up from 369.4 in April.
- The all services RPI annual rate is 3.5%, down from 3.6% last month.

Large upward effects came from:

- Recreation and culture, with prices overall rising by 0.9% between April and May 2017 compared with a fall of 0.4% a year ago. Within this category the major contribution came from games, toys and hobbies, particularly computer games. Price movements for these games are dependent on the composition of bestseller charts and can fluctuate from month to month. For example, the overall price rise between April and May follows a fall between March and April. Other upward pressures within recreation and culture came from increased prices for data processing equipment and package holidays;
- Food and non-alcoholic beverages, where prices overall rose slightly between April and
 May this year compared with a fall a year ago. The latest rise continues the upward



movement observed from late 2016 and comes from a variety of product groups, particularly sugar, jam, syrups, chocolate and confectionery where prices of cartons and boxes of chocolates rose between April and May this year;

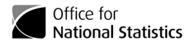
- Clothing and footwear, where prices overall for rose by 0.5% between April and May this
 year compared with a fall of 0.2% a year ago. The upward effect came principally from
 children's clothing. Sales patterns may have contributed to the price movements, as the
 proportion of items on sale fell between April and May this year, having risen a year ago;
 and
- Furniture, household equipment and maintenance, where prices overall rose by 1.2% between April and May this year, the largest rise between these two months since 2008. Between the same two months in 2016, prices rose by 0.4%. The main upward contributions came from lounge furniture and household textiles.

A small upward effect came from:

Housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels, as further price increases for electricity
entered the index in May. The effect is partially offset by a downward contribution from
owner occupiers' housing costs.

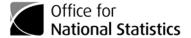
A large downward effect came from:

• Transport, with the main downward contributions coming from motor fuels and transport services, particularly air and sea fares. Petrol and diesel prices each fell this year, by 1.0 and 1.6 pence per litre respectively. This is the third successive month of price falls. A year ago, their prices rose by 2.8 and 3.0 pence per litre respectively. The timing of Easter has had a significant effect on movements in air and sea fares. These fell by 6.4% and 10.8% respectively between April and May this year, down from April prices which were influenced by Easter falling in that month. In 2016, when Easter fell in March, air and sea fares rose between April and May by 3.8% and 0.1% respectively. Prices economic commentary: May 2017 presents further analysis.

Bread and cereals

- Small downward effect.
- Prices overall fell this year but were little changed a year ago, with the main downward contribution coming from packs of individual cakes.
- Partially offset by small upward contributions coming from chilled pizzas and bread, where
 prices overall rose this year but fell a year ago.

Meat

- Small upward effect.
- Prices overall fell this year by less than a year ago, with the main upward contributions coming from pork chops and prepacked sliced cooked ham.

Fish

- Small upward effect.
- Prices overall rose this year but fell a year ago, with the main upward contributions coming from processed fish products.
- Partially offset by a small downward contribution coming from fresh salmon fillets, where
 prices overall rose this year by less than a year ago.

Oils and fats

- Small upward effect.
- Prices overall rose this year but fell a year ago, particularly for margarine/low fat spread.

Sugar, jam, syrups, chocolate and confectionery

- Small upward effect.
- Prices overall rose this year but fell a year ago, particularly for cartons/boxes of chocolates.
- Partially offset by a small downward contribution coming from chocolate covered ice cream bars, where prices overall fell this year but rose a year ago.

Food products not elsewhere covered

- Small upward effect.
- Prices overall rose this year but fell a year ago, particularly for cook-in sauces.

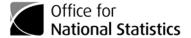

Fuels and lubricants

- Large downward effect.
- The average price of petrol across the month, as recorded for the CPIH, fell by 1.0 pence per litre between April and May 2017 to stand at 116.4 pence per litre.
- Last year, the average price of petrol rose by 2.8 pence per litre between April and May 2016 to stand at 108.7 pence per litre.
- The average price of diesel fell by 1.6 pence per litre between April and May 2017 to stand at 118.7 pence per litre, compared with a rise of 3.0 pence per litre a year earlier to stand at 109.5 pence per litre.

Maintenance and repairs

- Small downward effect.

RECONCILIATION OF CPI AND RPI

(Table 5 of the Consumer Price Inflation Dataset)

This table identifies the main factors contributing to the differences between the unrounded inflation rates for the CPI and the RPI. These differences are broken down into: mortgage interest payments, other housing components excluded from the CPI, other differences in the coverage of goods and services, and the formula effect. The final column titled 'other differences including weights' is derived as a residual.

This table currently compares CPI with RPI. In due course it will be updated to compare CPIH with RPI.

The difference between the CPI and RPI unrounded annual rates in May 2017 was -0.75 percentage points, narrowing from -0.82 percentage points in April 2017.

The main factor contributing to the narrowing was:

• Other differences including weights, which decreased the RPI 12-month rate relative to the CPI 12-month rate by 0.15 percentage points between April and May 2017. The effect came mainly from games, toys and hobbies; insurance; air fares; clothing and footwear; and fuels and lubricants. This was partially offset by sea fares.

The main off-setting factors were:

- Other housing components excluded from the CPI, which increased the RPI 12-month rate relative to the CPI 12-month rate by 0.05 percentage points between April and May 2017. The effect came mainly from house depreciation.
- The formula effect, which increased the RPI 12-month rate relative to the CPI 12-month rate by 0.03 percentage points between April and May 2017. The effect came mainly from recreation and culture.
- Mortgage interest payments, which increased the RPI 12-month rate by 0.02 percentage points between April and May 2017 but are excluded from the CPI.

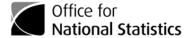

HOUSING, WATER, ELECTRICITY, GAS AND OTHER FUELS

Electricity, Gas and Other Fuels

EDF Energy has announced changes to its standard variable electricity and gas tariffs, effective from June 21. Standard variable dual fuel direct debit tariff will increase by 7.2% to £1,160 a year. The standard variable gas tariff will increase by 5.5%, while the standard electricity tariff will increase by 9%. (media.edfenergy.com 12 April 2017)

TRANSPORT

Fuels and Lubricants

- Oil prices have risen after futures traders increased their bets on a renewed price upswing
 even though physical markets remain bloated, especially from a relentless rise in U.S.
 drilling. Brent crude futures LCOc1 had risen 23 cents to \$48.38 per barrel, while U.S. West
 Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude futures CLc1 gained 17 cents to \$46.00 per barrel. Traders
 said the price rises came as data showed speculative traders had increased their investment
 in crude futures by taking on large volumes of long positions. (uk.reuters.com 12 June 2017)
- When considering the price of petrol between May and June 2017, it may be useful to note that the average price of petrol rose by 2.3 pence per litre between May and June 2016, standing at 111.0 pence per litre as measured in the CPIH.
- A 1 pence change on average in the cost of a litre of motor fuel contributes approximately
 0.02 percentage points to the 1-month change in the CPIH.

Passenger Transport by Air

HOUSING (RPI)

Mortgage interest payments (MIPs)

- The Bank of England Bank Rate remained unchanged at 0.25% on Thursday 11 May 2017.
 The next announcement and minutes from the Bank of England's Monetary Policy
 Committee are scheduled to be published on 15 June 2017.
- The change in average mortgage interest rates recorded in the RPI was -0.02 percentage points between May and June 2016. The Bank of England Bank Rate remained unchanged at 0.5% in May 2016.
- A one percentage point change in the average mortgage interest rate contributes approximately 0.9 percentage points to the 1-month percentage change in the RPI.



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
